Nevertheless it is important to remember that the ground equipment will need replacing in due course so we must not become complacent. Allowances have already been made for the increased costs of maintaining the ground and repaying the ECB loan.

As ever, I extend my thanks for everyone who has made the club what it is today.

After a few seasons trying to motivate the playing membership to improve their cricket I've come to realise that with a few exceptions, it's not something we have an appetite for as a club. At a time when it has never been easier to get access to free coaching material. When I made it very clear that I would help anyone action any ideas that they wanted to bring to training. Not one person came to me to see if they could help themselves or anyone else. I'll reiterate here that we have a seriously talented group of young players coming through. The U15 squad train TWICE A WEEK in the summer as well as attending senior nets. It is not acceptable to me to let these young players think you can just doss about at training and expect to see improvements. I only want an hour and a half a week of quality training from the senior players. We must create an environment that continues to challenge us and these kids. Don't be embarrassed to try. I see you all caring on match days, let's see some of that on a Wednesday as well in 2025. Enjoy taking it seriously.

First XI

The 2nd XI finished the 2024 league season in 4th place, recording nine wins and seven losses, and at one stage challenging for a promotion spot. This was a very pleasing result, and – more importantly – promises more for the coming 2025 season.

We were blessed – compared to recent seasons – with a relatively stable side. This allowed us to draw regularly on a core group of players who knew their role in the side and complemented each other well. As a result, we built up some real momentum in the middle of the summer, stringing together five consecutive wins at one point.

Being able to call on a group of talented young players either establishing themselves or making their way into the senior sides was a huge contributor to this stability and balance, and there is no doubt that our young seam bowling attack was central to our successes on the pitch. Several opposition captains commented on the excellent control that they were able to exert, and all of it at a very good pace.

After a slow start in the first couple of fixtures, the team really gelled in early June at Roffey, where we dug ourselves out of a deep hole (1 for 3 after the first over) to win a tight contest. Beyond the win itself, the game showed us what we were capable of when we put our minds to it, and from then on we started to perform in the moments that mattered, enabling us to close out most of the games we should have won and challenge hard for games that were in the balance. Other tight wins against Birdham and Middleton demonstrated that the Roffey game wasn't a one off.

Craig Scott and Dimi Mendis combined beautifully at Roffey to take seven wickets, and they offered a vital alternative to the young seamers throughout most of the season, finishing with 29 wickets between them, many of them taken at crucial points in a game, helping to turn the tide in our favour. They were ably supported by both Tom Lewis's leg spin (particularly in the return fixture against Roffey, where he bowled beautifully) and Richie Dale's...erm...spin (whatever it is, it works).

But the real strength of the side was the consistency of the seam attack, led by Ed Helps, Angelo Twinkle, and Gus Crawley, who took 42 wickets between them, all at a combined strike rate well below one wicket in every twenty balls. And there was no let up when this group began to tire – the opposition were then asked to deal with the same probing lines and lengths from the likes of Huey Pitcher, Dananjaya Weerawansa, Joe Crawley, Hugo Brinsmead-Maclean and Will Clark.

Looking forward to the 2025 season, it is clearly the batting that needs work – although there were good scores here and there, we relied far too much on some old hands, especially Craig, Richie, Kevin Thorns and occasionally the skipper to dig in and put a score on the board. In 2024, the common characteristic of the Henfield batsman was a good start: although sprinkled with good looking shots, most of these good starts were ultimately thrown away, undone as a result of chasing one that didn't need chasing. In 2025, I expect the common characteristic

to be runs on the board: we need to convert good starts into big innings. The batting talent is there.

My thanks to Dimi for standing in as skipper in mid-summer, and in particular to Tim Furber and Phil Tremewan who both generously gave their time, fair mindedness and patience to umpire for us, sometimes in very trying circumstances.

Third XI

The results:

Played 15, Won 6, Lost 8, tied 1, abandoned 1, cancelled 2. Total points 286, League position 7th.

It is worth noting that these stats represent a solid improvement on the prior season, with 2 more victories and an additional 56 league points and 1 league place achieved.

Season overview:

The first point to make about the 2024 season is that availability for the 3rd XI showed significant improvement from 2023. We were able to field decent sides for all our fixtures, if sometimes a little short on batting. I was thoroughly pleased that there were no repeats of the 2 fixture concessions we were forced to make in 2023. Thank you to all who made themselves available to support the side throughout the season.

The mantra of the 3's remains two-fold. Firstly, to support the development of the colts contingent as they transition into playing senior cricket, whilst secondly, providing an opportunity for senior players to continue playing competitive cricket. The senior players facilitating the development of the colts and benefiting from their youthful energy and contributions on the field!

I believe that the 2024 season was a shining example of the 3's side delivering against this mantra, and this can be no better illustrated than by looking at examples from both our first and final games of the year.....

Our first fixture saw us travel away to play St Peters, having been put into bat we left ourselves somewhat short by only managing to post 155-8, and were unfortunately unable to defend this total. However, upon taking the field, the colts' development and contributions were clearly displayed. The new ball being given to Joe Crawley and Seb Thorns. Joe took the first over, and following on from his success in 2023 sent the stumps flying with his 4th delivery. Up stepped Seb, the slightly younger of the 2 colts, 3rd delivery, stumps everywhere... Anything you can do, I can do better! While our 2 young opening bowlers went on the take 2 wickets each, the St Peters middle order steadied the ship and were able to pick off our total in relatively risk-free fashion by milking ones and two's and securing the victory for only 4 wickets down.

Our final game was also away, this time at Keymer & Hassocks. A damp pitch played host to a wonderful bowling display from the other and of the age spectrum (I won't give away his actual age but I do believe he was 54 years older than an opening bowler that day!). Our beloved Sri Lankan senior Naleen Sumanasekara (Dexy) walked onto the pitch 2 wickets below the top wicket taker in our division for

the season. While the opening wicket was taken again by Seb Thorns (another set of stumps everywhere from an inswinger no doubt), Dexy proved that the old boys can still do the business by taking enough wickets to secure the League award for the most wickets in our division. At the end of the game, the divisions' bowling contest was comfortably secured as Dexy walked off the field with all his teammates thoroughly celebrating his 8 overs, 3 maidens, 6 wickets for 9 runs!!

Those 2 situations provide a delightful illustration of our season, and the purpose of our side. What should also be noted was the support that the whole team provided to each and every player in all situations throughout the season. Everyone celebrated Joe and Seb's wickets in the first game, just as everyone celebrated Dexys "6 for" in the last game. Not only do all the team celebrate the successes, but they also share in the disappointments and support people through their challenges. This environment is exactly what is required to deliver the 3's mantra and most importantly to support the colts development. It's something I try to encourage in the side, but the responsibility to deliver it sits with every single player, not just the captain. I am thoroughly proud to see such relentless support for our team members. Long may we be able to deliver this kind of cricketing environment.

Creating such an environment, creates the cricketers of the future. Our colts have delivered beyond expectations over the last few seasons to the extent that both the 2023 and 2024 "players player of the season" awards have been rightly issued to 13 year old colts. It would be amiss to conclude this season's review without mentioning the 2024 winner Toby Boyce. It's tricky for colts to transition into senior cricket in any role, but to do so as a Wicketkeeper and future opening batsmen is probably one of the toughest. Toby had some challenging games behind the sticks at the start of the season, but developed superbly as the season progressed and was fully supported by his teammates as illustrated by his award. Toby played with passion, commitment and emotion, and reminded me while why we all play this game. He had a great season behind the stumps, growing in confidence, stature and performance. Put this alongside with some very resilient batting displays and he has already shown he is one to watch for many years to come.

2024 has again been a season I have thoroughly enjoyed with a team I am proud to captain. I'll conclude this review with a look to the future and use of a phrase coined by our 2ns XI captain during the year – Floreat HCC!!!

It's their hard work over the years that is now delivering such vital youth availability and talent to the 3rd XI.

The 2024 season started rather earlier than normal cricket seasons for the Under 14. We actually started our season on 29th October 2023 in the indoor league at BACA.

After a tough start with losses on gameday 1 against Burgess Hill and Brighton & Hove, we got the campaign going on game day 2 with a win against Lewes Priory and our momentum built over the remaining match days.

At the end of the regular season we had actually finished 4th in the table and had qualified for the play offs. We secured our progress with a thumping victory over St Peters, the highlights being Seb taking 4 wickets for 13 runs in an exemplary display of swing bowling, and Toby captaining the team expertly with a perfectly timed powerplay, which included him scoring 14 off one ball and leading to his retirement for 26*.

In the semi-final we were drawn against Preston Nomads who had gone through the regular season unbeaten, had beaten us already and were the red hot favourites for the title.

Bowling 1st, the team bowled and fielded brilliantly. Nomads were dismissed for 51 in 6 overs. Game on! However, in true Henfield CC tradition we were soon in all sorts of trouble. We slumped to 8-3. A rather big challenge ahead! Seb and Angelo then managed to build a little partnership and took the score 33 before Angelo was dismissed.

So last man standing and still needing 19 to win. Seb then stood firm. Batting sensibly and protecting his wicket for all he was worth, he managed to see us to victory. Finishing on 9 not out, off no less than 25 balls, the team won a truly memorable game.

We played our nemesis Brighton & Hove in the final. In a good game Brighton & Hove won again, but to finish runners up in tough competition was a great start to the season.

After a really good winter of nets at Steyning, the outdoor season saw would see us compete in Division 1, after winning promotion in 2023. We were set for a challenging year ahead. The early season weather was truly terrible and games and practices were cancelled left, right and centre. Before we even managed to play any league games, we participated in a Development Team cup competition at Preston Nomads.

A day long tournament of 9 a-side cricket, held on 5th May with teams made up of 6 juniors and 3 senior players. Angelo, Will, Joe, Toby, Seb and Andrew were joined by Dimi Mendis, Mike White and Kevin Thorns. Playing 3 games in the day we won all 3 against B Hill, Lewes Priory and Preston Nomads.

A fantastic achievement for the team to win another trophy.

After 2 cancellations due to weather our league season finally started on 7th May at Brighton & Hove. Having thought the season ahead would be tough, this game

really showed that we were in for challenging summer with matches against some really strong sides. Losing by 62 runs, having bowled and fielded really well, we unfortunately never really got going with the bat. It was a lesson in putting a higher value on your wicket and batting sensibly.

A change in fortune was just around the corner. After the Brighton & Hove game the rest of the season saw us beat: Rottingdean, Preston Nomads, Haywards Heath, Ditchling, Preston Nomads (away by no less than 9 wickets), Ditchling (via concession) and a final win against Haywards Heath. We also lost 3 games; a really tight game against St Peters which went to the last ball, Brighton & Hove (in a much closer game) and Felbridge & Sunnyside. All 3 of those defeats were in close games which could easily have swung either way.

There were multiple highlights over the course of the season and I'm sure we will miss some. Ben Smith continued to produce very valuable contributions in our middle order and he top scored with 20 in our successful (just) run chase against Rottingdean. Against Preston Nomads we started the game with just 8 players. Seb stood up and opened the batting, hanging in for 5 overs to allow others to arrive at the ground. Then, with just 4 runs needed off the last over, newcomer Frank Evans stood up against his old team and took the wicket we needed to secure a memorable victory. Frank has been an excellent addition to our team, settling in seamlessly and also showing great development in all aspects of his game over the season.

Away to Haywards Heath we put in one of our most complete performances. Will Clark and Angelo Twinkle both retired for scores in the 30's. Then Will capped off an incredible all-round performance by taking a hat trick! Beating Ditchling at home we put in one of our best batting performances with both Will and Joe getting over 30 and Ben Smith bashing a quickfire 27 off 16 balls at the end.

The victory away to Preston Nomads was our most complete performance of the season. We outplayed them in every facet of the game – a true cricketing lesson. We restricted them to 113-5 from 20 overs. We then easily chased this down with 4 overs to spare with Will, Angelo and Gus leading the way. At this stage of the season we sat second in the league behind Brighton & Hove and with a chance of overtaking them if we could beat them on the common.

The losses to St Peters, Brighton and Felbridge were all exceptionally close affairs. We had opportunities in all of the games to swing things in our favour but sometimes fine margins make the difference, and there were perhaps times during these games where our usually high standards in fielding and catching slipped a little and perhaps cost us. However, we bounced back in our final game against Haywards Heath with a thumping 10 wicket victory – Joe Crawley retiring for 40 from just 32 balls.

So at the end of the season we finished 3rd in a very tough league. Brighton & Hove and Felbridge & Sunnyside finished above us. A fantastic season with the highlights being the last over win at Rottingdean in near total darkness and the 9 wicket win away to Nomads, which is the best cricket this team has played since they were formed. It was a real team effort, with contributions from everyone over the course of the year and we demonstrated that on our day we are a match for anyone in the county.

To round off the season we then entered the Cricket Festival in August. 4 long, hard games of cricket were ahead of us.

We started the festival away at Crawley Down. On a great day for playing cricket we were blessed with fantastic weather, lovely hosts and saw some outstanding batting. The highlights of this game; Will Clark scoring the 1st ever 100 for the team and Angelo taking 4-0 bowling his leg breaks. The game turned out be a little one sided in our favour but the team played it in the right spirit despite the mismatch in abilities between the 2 sides.

Wednesday saw us host a hugely determined Felbridge & Sunnyside at home. Batting 1st we scored 252 – 4. Jimmy Thomas scored his highest ever score of 32, Angelo scored 50* but the real highlight was our reluctant opener that Gus Crawley scoring 101*. The teams 2nd individual hundred in the space of 3 days.

In response Felbridge & Sunnyside set out to make sure they didn't lose this game. In a hugely gutsy effort they batted for no less than 45 overs losing only 8 wickets. The game finished as a draw. Lots of learnings for us to take from the game; the value of ones wicket in win, lose or draw cricket, having to sometimes look to employ less conventional strategies to get wickets and how real focus and determination can get you a long way.

Thursday, we travelled to St James Montefiore. With plenty of bad weather around, the aim here was to try and get a quick win if possible, before the scheduled rain came. St James had a couple of last minute no shows for their team and went into the game with 9 players. Thankfully we dismissed them quickly for 68.

In chasing this down we did lose 5 wickets but great batting by Jacob and Frank rebuilt the innings, though Jacob was out with 19 still needed. Toby joined Frank (14 not out) and calmly saw us home with 7 off 7 balls, getting us over the line just as it started to rain, caressing a cover drive for 4. With lots of rain around Sussex and with plenty of games unlikely to finish we still had a chance to finish high enough to qualify for the final with 1 home game left to play.

Friday was the last game of the festival against Ifield at home.

After a decent bowling effort we were chasing 170 for victory. Ifield had shown great application and after a slow and very watchful start they managed to accelerate the run rate later in the innings when they had wickets left in hand. However, 170 looked a very chaseable total on a glorious day on the Common.

Playing the game as though it was a t20 game rather than a long form festival match, we lost cheap wicket and had quickly slumped to 545. A long way from victory. Further wickets continued to fall and before too long were staring at a hefty defeat with the score at 102-9. Seb and Jacob then batted together for no less than 12 overs. Seb being solid and Jacob playing his shots. Calling on his full repertoire of cuts, nudges and pulls Jacob puts in truly memorable batting display. A great partnership had put us in a position where we had a chance to win the game and also a great chance for Jacob to score 50 and take him past a significant personal milestone. Having decided that now was the time to attack, Ifield bowled a half tracker, Jacob absolutely smashed the ball and looked like it was going to go for 6 up the hill. Alas a brilliant catch brought the innings to an

end. Jacob had battled brilliantly for 59 balls, scoring 48 runs whilst all round him wickets were falling. So close and yet so far.

That final game was a good reflection of how the season had been for us. We played some brilliant cricket in all the competitions we entered but along with great highs, we were also capable of not quite doing enough to win in certain games. However the effort levels on and off the pitch have been incredible. The commitment to train, improve, play games and take on new challenges has been amazing. No less than 8 of the squad played adult cricket in some form this summer. All held there own and some have even won significant club awards, which will be mentioned elsewhere in the report.

Overall we played 16 games, we won 9, drew 1 and lost 5.

Thanks to all the players and their commitment to training, matches, helping to get the facilities ready before games and cleared away after games. It has been another very enjoyable season and for us it is a privilege to look after such a great group. The challenge now is to maintain our position. We have a small squad in comparison to many clubs and it is always is a team effort to compete against these big clubs. We've already started our winter practice and the boys enthusiasm is as great as ever. We must ensure that they adopt a mindset to practice with purpose, establish the areas they need to improve, and work out how to do so.

Thanks to all the parents, grandparents, friends and family who have come to watch and support. Your help with the bar (both sides of it), preparing drinks, making teas, driving your kids across the county to get to games on time, is so very much appreciated. It makes Henfield a great venue to come and play cricket. The opposition love coming here nearly us much as we love to play here.

Another successful season that has seen many improvements across the board. I am very happy to see a competitive streak in the squad, improved game awareness and an appetite for fielding that puts most of the rest of the club to shame!
